General Notes

- All grades are factored into GPAs. All repeated coursework is averaged.
- The minimum cumulative GPA required to apply is 3.0. A minimum GPA of 3.0 or higher is recommended in all prerequisite courses with no grade below a "C."
- Graduate Record Exam (GRE) may be required.

Observation Hours & Experiential Learning

Applicants must observe physical therapists in a variety of inpatient and outpatient settings, although the minimum number of hours varies by <u>program</u>. (The more hours, the better!) By observing a therapist, students gain a better understanding of the profession, including the various job settings and the populations served. These hours may be paid or volunteer; some students find paid, part-time work as a physical therapy aide.

In addition to observing, students are encouraged to be service-minded; that is, by getting involved with a related service organization in the community. Working with a faculty member as part of a research team is also highly encouraged.

Graduate Record Exam (GRE)

The GRE is a standardized, multiple-choice exam taken at a testing center. The exam consists of three parts: analytical writing, verbal reasoning, and quantitative reasoning. You will receive a score for each part. Not all programs require the GRE; click here for a list of programs and exam deadlines. Students electing to take the exam typically do so several months before applying for admission. Students should allow adequate time to study and prepare for the exam. Application Process

A centralized application service is available through the Physical Therapy Centralized Application Service (PTCAS). It is to the applicant's benefit to apply as soon as possible after PTCAS opens in mid-June. Unless taking a gap year, most students apply early in their senior year. Students may begin applying after PTCAS opens in mid-June.

Letters of Recommendation

Students will typically gather three letters of recommendation: (1) physical therapist, (2) faculty member, and (3) either a second physical therapist or faculty member. The letters should address the applicant's ability to handle rigorous coursework and to work with others in a healthcare setting.
